Did you know that you can report damage directly to Council through the Snap Send Solve app on your phone or tablet?

Just download the free app, take a picture, select your location and submit the report.

This app will also report damage to Telstra, SA Water and other groups with infrastructure in your location – not just Franklin Harbour.

You can report damage to playgrounds, footpaths, Telstra pit covers, leaking water, graffiti, street lights, overgrown trees, public toilets damage, pot holes, rubbish bin repairs and so much more.

Your report will be updated so you can keep track of how your submission is progressing.

Fire

The year 1980 was the worst year that I ever experienced as the silo manager. Less than 500 tonnes were received in Cowell. The 10th of December was Mary's birthday and as it happened there was also a council meeting. During the harvest period I usually excused myself, but on this occasion I elected to attend for just a short session and to have lunch with the other councillors. It was a hot windy day, a good day to enjoy the meeting insulated from the heat.

During the morning a blackout occurred, and I immediately reacted by ringing the silo from the office phone. Sid Story answered confirming that there was indeed a power failure. Nevertheless we carried on with the meeting for some time when we were informed that the fire was at Danger Corner. This was serious. The fire was on our property! What a disaster! Never have we been in this situation before. Where had the fire originated? And how? These questions raced through my mind. I learnt that Malcolm was at Pike's Corner reaping seed from a very drought stricken crop, and he saw the fire approaching so he parked the header in the creek bed. He later moved it to Reg Hanson's house area, where later the Fire Control officers established their headquarters as a central point for operations.

By this time the fire travelled very quickly as there was plenty of dry material in the creek. At this point the fire was a raging inferno. I arrived at the scene of the fire just after the fire had crossed the Bungalow road into what was Ida Harding's property. Both the tractors were at Poodra hitched up to various types of machinery. Ian set off for the Danger Corner area with a tractor and plough, Here he met up with Dean Jacobs who was operating his tractor with dozer. Baldy Wilson drove the other Chamberlain down to Hanson's place and assisted Malcolm to hitch up the disc plough. There was no time to lose!

There was the new home of Melville Gale's and also that of Bill Gale's to defend. Luckily I found Malcom and we arranged that he have the tractor and plough near the road so that it would only take a few minutes to cross the road into Bill Gale's farm.

In the meantime the Cowell police had arrived. David Vogelsang accompanied me over to Bill Gale's home to inform him of the nature of the crisis. Bill had just coupled his plough and tractor and his first intention was to make fire breaks around the new home. I told him our tractor and plough was ready to cross the road to make a series of firebreaks across his paddock using the track across the paddock as a base. Because the gate into Bill's paddock was too narrow we opened the fence and David controlled the increasing traffic.

The Plough was set at a shallow depth, just deep enough to make an effective break. The fire was approaching steadily, the wind speed was only slight, so this gave us a bit more time to do the job. We worked the tractor at the fastest possible speed. I then decided to drive to Danger Corner to assess the situation there. On the way there were many instances where the dire was burning back unattended. Given the magnitude of the fire front this was to be expected. The fire had progressed from Dean Jacob's house to Danger Corner where it jumped two roads. The Cowell-Mangalo and the Cowell-Kimba road, the latter being the most dangerous, where the hills carrying a lot of dry vegetation and scrub broke down into two low ridges at the south eastern end.

The western ridge contained dense mallee trees down to the creek and the fire raced through this to reach and cross the road. This happened near the Culver Creek where there was enough roughage on the ground to fuel it to the hulls west of Reg's house. At this point being fanned by the north wind it raced uphill sending up a huge column of black smoke. This locality was where Dick Pike had developed his mines. The fire had become firmly established on this scrubby hill putting huge columns of smoke into the sky. Fortunately this area was not large and soon burnt out.

On our house block, Section 34 Miltalie, a fire unit was placed near the house with radio Contact, so the situation was well monitored. It was a matter of waiting for the fire to burn back until it could be attacked and brought under control. Eventually this happened and the area was made safe. After crossing the road at Danger Corner, the fire had a large front which was burning back, but at this stage it was too late to stop it from getting into the small gullies. This made it necessary to get behind these gullies to make fire breaks. Leith Stening had arrived with his tractor and plough, and he volunteered to make breaks through this long narrow gully which was arable to the boundary fence line with Dean Jacobs'. This area was again inspected later in the afternoon, there being only one place where the fine was able to burn slowly across this break but fortunately it was quickly extinguished.

Camping Around Franklin Harbour

To book a site within the District Council of Franklin Harbour permits must be obtained online at <u>www.eyrepeninsula.com/camping</u>.

All campers must have self contained toilet facilities except where toilet facilities are provided. Local Residents and Ratepayers are able to camp at no cost however must still book online.

To book a permit online there are 3 campground areas:

'Port Gibbon Beach Camping' formerly known as the beach access sites these includes Port gibbon jetty, Hideaway, The Fence, Serenity, Flat Rocks, The Sanctuary and White Sands.

'Point Gibbon Campgrounds' includes Point Gibbon (15 allocated sites), Dunes, Mills Steps, Bush and Boat shed.

'Cowell RV Park' which has 22 designated sites.
