### **CEO News**

#### The Return of a Local Newspaper

Eyre Peninsula residents will have their own newspaper once again, with the announcement of the Eyre Peninsula Advocate publishing its first edition on Thursday September 30, 2021.

This is a welcome development after the permanent closure of both the Eyre Peninsula Tribune and the West Coast Sentinel earlier this year.

This newspaper will be published by Papers and Publications Ltd who are based in Balaklava and already publish the Plains Producer (est 1903) and the Two Wells Echo. Papers and Publications employ 16 people in the Mid North, and now three on the Eyre Peninsula, with plans to recruit more part time staff.

This was an initiative of the Cleve Council, with the backing of both the District Councils of Franklin Harbour and Kimba.

### **Foreshore Redevelopment**

With just over 3 months left to complete our foreshore works, the area is a hive of activity with:

- 1. Civil works on the marina now complete
- 2. Marina pontoon fingers, and all electrical and plumbing works on the marina to be complete in coming weeks
- Works are progressing well on construction of the new road and the Thompson Drive intersection upgrade.
- The Marina building now has a floor and wall frames and the final roof frames are being installed. The roof will be installed next.
- 5. The Aquatic Playground now has all underground plumbing installed, concrete surfaces will be the next step
- 6. The earthworks for the new boat/caravan parking area have been completed
- 7. The Basketball court base works are now underway.

#### Foreshore 2022

Whilst the plan has always been to fill and green the land enclosed by the new road on the foreshore, it was not part of the current redevelopment project. We have now been fortunate enough to secure grant funding for 2022 which will allow us to complete this final part of the "greening" and redevelopment of the Cowell Foreshore area.

Please find attached the latest iteration of the plan for this area, which includes wetland, open space and walkways. This will greatly enhance the amenity of this part of the foreshore, as well as catch and filter the stormwater flowing in from the main street outflow.





## THE FARM (part 4)

In the early days of the Franklin Habour Council, the Council bought and distributed wire netting, to farmers who made application, to be used on specific fence lines, and the Council was re-imbursed over a period of time. The overseer had to report to the Council, as to whether the farmer had erected his fence according to the specifications. There were some farmers who were brought to task. Over a period of time this fencing material became the property of the landowner. During the depression years of 1928 to 1932, a drought caused much damage to the wire netting fences, particularly as the strong winds blew dry grass and rubbish on to the wire netting. Later when the strong winds caused the soil to drift, it covered the rubbish and the netting fence. When the drought years ended and when time permitted, these fence lines had to be cleared and an extra line of wire was strained to add height to the existing fence. This was a temporary measure to make them sheep proof. The long term solution required the removal of the wire netting by digging it out, as the years rolled by ice-plant, which was prevalent, caused the netting to rust. The width of the wire netting was 36 inches(90cm) wide, in most cases there were about 30 inches(75cm) covered, so there were many tons of earth to be removed in the process of digging drifted fences.

On the Poodra farm there was only a small amount of drifted fence line, probably about 400 yards. Digging this netting out on our property was possibly the hardest work that Charlie Degner and I had to do. We must have dug out at least five miles of interior and roadside fences. Perhaps the hardest part was about half a mile of broom bush on top of the range of Reg Ramsey's boundary, where the north to northwest wind blew his drift into the hills. Rubbish broom bush and drift sand were all entangled in the wire netting. We had to clear the fence line of rubbish, dig away the sand where possible, untie the wire and netting from the post. The broom bush would have to be axed so the sand could be cleared before we could pull the wire netting. Sometimes several attempts were made to cut the broom bush clear before the netting could be lifted. This was very hard work on the back as well as the hands and fingers.



In those year we would walk to work. For me the distance would have been at least two and a half miles and for Charlie about a mile and a half. The last part of our walk to work we had to climb to the top of the range. Today this job would have been simple, the whole lime would have been cleared with a dozer.

During the 1970's further expansion took place, I bought Allen Hanson's farm. This purchase was to set up Ian and Malcolm with a farm each. Although separated they were close enough to help each other in busy times. This also meant doubling up on the cropping program, and increasing sheep numbers.

With the Hanson's farm was Grant's Hill, which dad had previously owned. We had terrible trouble working this new farm. The old fencing material had not been picked up but just left lying along the old fence lines. Using machines with shares, we were getting blocked as we were raking up great lengths of wire that we promptly loaded onto the ute and took to the rubbish dump in Cowell. We sowed barley and wheat the first, the crop looked great. Harry Schiller wanted to get back behind the paddocks of crop to have a look at the marble, ect. Harry was the man responsible in finding the jade deposits in the Minbrie hills. I offered him a lift to the back paddock where the marble material existed. As we skirted the crop I asked him to give an estimate of the possible crop yield for an insurance cover. He was amazed and estimated yield of 12 to 14 bag crop per acre. This did not eventuate, the finish was rather sudden and the grain was affected, but even then the yield was not too bad.

The following year we sowed a fair amount of oats, the west variety. A massive crop in the first two paddocks yielded more than 15 bags an acre. Then a hell of a hot north wind arrived, after that we barely reapt 5 bags an acre. The sheep did very well and had two years feed from this disaster.

When Hanson's place included the Grant's Hill property this land was bought by Uncle Frank Jacobs from the Hissey family. When he decided to enter the blacksmith business in Cowell, Dad bought this farm from him. Early in the depression of the late 1920's and early 1930's this land suffered from the overgrazing of the Speed property which had a very large mob of sheep on it.

Mr Jack Wakelin's house across the road from this property had a stump fence built around the house, this type of fence was popular in these days. Mrs Wakelin, formerly Elsie Mildwaters (Granny Jacob's cousin) had a lovely garden established. This was ruined as drift from Speed's paddock covered the stump fence up to the level of the windows on the west side. All the properties on the east of this property became a huge dust bowl being spread by strong winds from the north and northwesterly direction.

When the drought finally broke and with the early rains a cropping program began. It was truly amazing to see the amount of barrel clover that germinated. With four bad years of drifting conditions just concluded, it was amazing to see there was still clover seed on the ground, and germinating.

# Counting Around Franklin Harbour

Did you know that camping areas are provided in the following areas within the Franklin Harbour:

The RV Park, Beach Access Sites on Beach Road, Port Gibbon, Lucky Bay and Ulbana Weir (Payne's Weir)

All campers must have self contained toilet facilities except where toilet facilities are provided.

Permits are required to camp within the Port Gibbon & Lucky Bay area for \$15 per night per vehicle or \$75 per week per vehicle with a maximum stay of 14 days. These can be purchased at the allocated pay stations at the locations listed as well as the Council Office, Cowell Hardware, Cowell Roadhouse.

Permits are required at all other camp sites including Ulbana Weir, RV Park and accesses along Beach Road for \$10 per night per vehicle or \$50 per week per vehicle with a maximum stay of 14 days.

Local Residents and Rate Payers are able to camp at no cost.
