

RAPID ANTIGEN TEST COLLECTION POINT

RAT Kit Distribution - Concession Holders

As you may be aware, eligible Concession Card Holders are able to access free RATs.

What you need to do: Concession Card Holders must register, prior to collection, on the SA Health website South Australian Government - Rapid antigen test collection (forms.sa.gov.au). Clients are also encouraged to call the office before presenting, to confirm their pick-up time.

All persons entering the Council office for RAT kit distribution, should be wearing a mask.

Concession Card Holders are eligible for 5 x RAT kits a month, but no more than 2 lots (10 kits) in a 3 monthly period.

Fire Prevention Reminder

The upper Eyre Peninsula has experienced a year of high rainfall and subsequently fuel loads (vegetation) are also at an extremely high level and are curing fast. Your action is now required to help reduce the high fire risk.

This year the Fire Danger Season begins on the 1st November, as a property owner you are responsible to take action to prevent the outbreak of fire or the sustainability of fire on your property.

Fire permits for broad acre burning around sheds and houses in the Franklin Harbour district may be issued from the start of the fire danger season for one week until the 8th of November.

Councils Fire Prevention Officer will be carrying out inspections in the Township under Section 105F of the Fire and Emergency Services Act, follow up notices will be sent to non-compliant owners.



WATER

The casing lasted about forty years trouble free. Reg Deer picked a replacement site just east of the old Excelsior tennis courts. When the hole reached a depth of forty-one feet, in hard rock, it barred further progress. Although water had been located, the quantity proved insufficient. Another boring plant operated in the district with some success owned by Malcolm Duet of Adelaide. A really good plant, he agreed to use the hole that was forty-one feet deep, but it would cost the boys \$125.00 an hour. Eventually the hole was extended to sixty-seven feet, about four and a half hours work. A huge amount of good quality water was found, somewhere between five and six thousand gallons per hour.

In wet years all one had to do was to walk along the bed of the creek to find water flowing from spider holes like small artesian bores. There were two dams at Poodra, which were banked to hold the soakage water. I have known the largest dam to fill and run over in years of good rainfall, other than that the water holding quality was not good.

Dad decided to sink a dam across the road to catch the run off from the road to Danger Corner. Mr. Joe Noll came up with his crawler tractor to do the ripping and horses and buckscraper were used to remove the ploughed material and to build the banks. This dam proved to be a winner, there being good run-off from the road and the dam was seldom empty.

As a matter of fact the drain from the road to the dam had to be cut on numerous occasions as the dam was filled to capacity. I decided to make another dam behind this one so all the water could be utilized, but unfortunately the water holding material was not good and the water seeped away. Bryce Matthews was hired to sink this dam.

My next project was to make a dam up in School Hill paddock and Bryce was contracted to do this job. It held water beautifully. It was unfortunate that a seam of rock became evident in one corner restricting us from going as deep as we wanted to go; otherwise this was a really good investment. In due course Ian and Malcolm decided to make a quicker water run, so Bryce was again brought in to do the heavy work with his dozer and the final touches were done by the council grader, this proving to be a first class job, with a quick water run off.

There was still one large section of the farm that was not adequately watered by supplies to the right areas. This was known as the Hill Paddock and included all the land bordering on the bungalow road. The sheep had to travel very long distances to the watering places and rectifying this situation was very desirable. This was begun in the Hill Paddock; a good feed area, catering for the western portion of the hills area of 900 acres. We first used a site picked by Mr Morrison on the edge of the creek, which drained many acres of the country including Ramseys farm. This position readily provided water at less than 20 feet, but as salty as the sea. Still in this same paddock we tried another site that cut off one gully where we found water of good quality but only a small supply.

Further up the paddock the late Reg Deer wanted us to bore a hole right on the boundary fence. This I could not agree with because the Ramsey's had a bore within 1.5 chain from the fence and it may have interfered with their supply of good water. He then settled for a

site some 300 yards from the fence. The water was good and I intended to use the hole in due course, but due to a thunder storm and a big run off of water which eventually flowed into the bore-hole causing the wall of the hole below the casing to collapse, this site was then abandoned.





CHANGE TO BIN COLLECTION DAY

Change to weekly waste collection arrangements

After many years of a shared arrangement for weekly rubbish collection (with DC Kimba and DC Cleve), from October 1st we moved to a contract with Veolia and our weekly rubbish collection day moved to THURSDAYS (from Tuesdays).

We have ceased collection of recycling bins (Yellow lid) for the time being as we have no facilities to effectively deal with this in Franklin Harbour. This is an issue for most remote regional councils, we are hopeful that the Strategic Review of EP waste currently underway will identify workable solutions to this issue.

Catholing Around Franklin Harbour Did you know that camping areas are provided in Franklin Harbour: Permits within the Port Gibbon & Lucky Bay area are \$15 per night or \$75 per week. Permits are required at all other camp sites including Ulbana Weir, RV Park and accesses along Beach Road for \$10 per night or \$50 per week. Permits can be purchased at pay stations along beach road as well as the Council Office, Hardware and the Roadhouse. To book a site at Point Gibbon permits must be obtained online at www.eyrepeninsula.com/camping.

All campers must have self contained toilet facilities except where toilet facilities are provided.

Local Residents and Rate Payers are able to camp at no cost.
