Cowell Foreshore Redevelopment

The Marina Green area continues to get greener as the grass coverage improves. It is amazing the impact of the grass. From a cost perspective it is a very small component of the project, but it has been absolutely transformational. The paving contractor has now completed all paving works in the Marina zone, and has almost completed all works on the water park side of the road. Once the paving is complete we can very quickly install seating and barbecues, lay turf around the water park and bouncy pillow area, spray seed lawn to the larger unfinished areas, and then put in trees and plants.

Although the project has taken longer than originally forecast, we have come in remarkably close to our original \$4.35 million budget for this program of works. When I commenced in November 2019, councils cash contribution to this project was forecast to be \$3.5 million, after rescoping the works and negotiating a larger percentage contribution of Federal grant funding we significantly reduced this to a forecast of \$1.35 million cash contribution.

Although works are not quite complete, we now forecast a cash contribution of \$1.45 million. Considering our tenders for the Waterpark and Landscaping works alone came in at \$2.0 million more than was budgeted for, this is an outstanding result (needless to say we did not accept any of those tenders) Equally importantly, it is also clear now that the end result is going to be stunning and absolutely transformational for Cowell and the wider district.

Over the past three years this small regional council has built a 35 km water scheme delivering water to 28 farms that previously had no access to water, built a 32 berth marina facility, undertaken a full redevelopment of the Cowell Foreshore that included a new road and additional parking areas, a substantial building overlooking the marina, a water playground, jumping pillow and basketball court, shelters, BBQ's, paths and paving and over 20,000sqm of landscaping. All of this was done during the time of Covid which raised the added challenges of shutdowns, supply chain problems, product shortages, and ever increasing prices.

The media has been full of stories about massive cost blowouts in projects across all three tiers of government, as well as the private sector. With the limited resources of a small council, cost "blowouts" on projects of this magnitude would be catastrophic so are simply not an option. We have to find a way to get the job done within budget and we have, again and again.

The way we do this is through the efforts of our small (less than 20 employees) but very resourceful and dedicated team with a "can do" attitude, where everyone "wears many different hats" everyday to get the job done, but get the job done they do. Well done team Franklin Harbour!

Elected members are often stereotyped as a conservative bunch but given the ambitious scope of works we have embarked upon and completed during the current local government term, that is clearly not the case in Franklin Harbour where great progress has and continues to be made.

For a small regional council to take on such an ambitious program of works is very rare indeed, and says something very positive about our elected member group. They should all be congratulated on the leadership, foresight and courage that they have demonstrated, and the results that have been delivered in Franklin Harbour during their term in office. This term has been a very good example of how by joining local government you can genuinely make a difference to your community. Are you enrolled to vote? (Are your details up-to- date)

Local Government (Council) Elections will take place in November 2022.

Participating in your local council election is one of the most direct ways you can make a difference to everyday life in your community, and voting is open to a wider range of people than State or Federal elections.

If you are enrolled for state elections in South Australia (for this Council area), you are automatically included on the council voters roll and will receive ballot papers through the post. All election materials, including your ballot papers, are mailed directly to the postal address you provided on the electoral roll. If you have changed your name or address you will need to update your enrolment details by visiting:

If you are **not** enrolled on the State electoral roll you may be eligible to register on the council supplementary roll if:

- You have been resident at your current address for at least one month; or
- You are a sole owner/occupier of rateable property; or
- You are **not** an Australian citizen but you have been a resident at your current address for at least one month; or
- You are a landlord for rateable property; or
- You are an organisation/business owner or occupier of rateable property; or

You are a group of owners or occupiers of rateable property. If you meet one or more of the criteria, you will need to apply.

Please note: Under the provisions of the Local Government (Elections) Act 1999, the Council Supplementary Roll is purged from 1 January in the year of an election. If previously enrolled on the Council Supplementary Roll, you need to reapply in order to receive a voting pack for the November 2022 Local Government elections.

Enrolment **must** be completed before **5pm 29 July 2022** to be eligible to vote.

If you are unsure or would like to check on your enrolment status, ring Bernadette at the Council office on 8629 2019.

Enrolment closes on the 29 July 2022.

SCHOOL DAYS

The Coolanie School opened in 1922; the classroom was situated on the eastern side of the church. It was a high building, and very cold, so a small wood heater was installed, but it favoured the teacher more than the pupils. Collecting small pieces of wood at dinner times was a chore for the students who were therefore late for lessons.

Being 6 years old I was a student of the Coolanie School when it opened. To get there I had to walk three miles. However, luckily the teacher, Mr. Conners, boarded at our house, so for those three months he rode a bike, I would get to donkey by getting to the top of White Hill going to school, and after school to the top of School Hill. Most teachers boarded at Mr. Herb Brine's home.

My school years at Coolanie were brief. The teacher for the second year was a Mr. Brown and it was early in the first term of the year that we moved to Cowell, and without knowing any children there that was to be a lot. However, it does not take young people long to become acquainted. Attending school in Cowell was a daunting time for me, having a new teacher, Miss Modystack. I learnt at the 1988 Centenary Celebration that she boarded at Uncle Bill Jacob's place, now the home of Butch and Sally Tonkin.

The Headmaster was Mr. W. A. Willshire. There were two class rooms; in the lower room the grades of one to three, in the upper room four to seven. Miss Modystack taught the grades one to three. The number of children in these grades must have been close to fifty, a monitor was later appointed to assist her. This person was Miss Edna Wiseman, a local Cowell girl. In the grades four to seven the number of pupils was nearly seventy. Miss Rachele Hissey, another local girl, was appointed monitor to assist Mr. Willshire. Rachele Hissey became the mother of Garry Klingberg. We returned to Poodra for the school year of 1927, when we three walked to the Coolanie School again, Allan Ramsey being our teacher.


During the latter years our country schools held a combined school picnic, the last one at Port Gibbon. For these sports days our teacher had the Coolanie School training every dinnertime. Allan, who was himself a good runner, kept details of all the running events and handicapped the scholars accordingly. Needless to say we did very well on the sands of the beach.

I'm afraid that I was not an enthusiastic scholar and wanted to leave school immediately on doing my Qualifying Certificate exam. This did not happen, as I was considered too young. We had a change of teachers when Eddie Pearce took Allan Ramsey's place. My school days ended before the Easter holidays of 1929. To end our final year in grade 7 we had to do an exam called the Qualifying Certificate, known as the Q. C. If I remember correctly the pass mark for this exam was 350 out of 700. If any scholars received more that 600 marks bursaries were given by the Education Department to provide a higher education at High Schools.

Prior to us leaving school, Dad bought a sulky so that we could drive to school. As all the spare stock were paddocked at Grant's Hill a trip down there was necessary to get the horse for the sulky. Little did I dream that I had to ride it home. He was a quiet old thing; put the bridle on and lead him back to the road. Dad said to me "get on his back and get going." This was my first ride, no saddle was taken down so Dad gave me a leg up, slapped the horse on the rump and away I went. Great! What an experience! My first horseback ride, I will never forget it; my backside was so sore that I was unable to walk for a week.

When school started we three Jacobs kids drove to school, much better than walking. When I left school Olive became the driver. When she left school Dad was of the opinion that Bub was going to ride horseback, but she had different ideas. While saddling up was taking place she would get her dinner and scoot over the hills, and she did it in record times.





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DATES TO REMEMBER

DISTRICT COUNCIL OF FRANKLIN HARBOUR COUNCIL MEETING

Wednesday 10th August 2022 @ 1:00pm in Council Chambers

Did you know that camping areas are provided in the following areas within the Franklin Harbour: The RV Park, Beach Access Sites on Beach Road, Port Gibbon, Lucky Bay and Ulbana Weir (Payne's Weir)

All campers must have self contained toilet facilities except where toilet facilities are provided.

Permits are required to camp within the Port Gibbon & Lucky Bay area for \$15 per night per vehicle or \$75 per week per vehicle with a maximum stay of 14 days. These can be purchased at the allocated pay stations at the locations listed as well as the Council Office, Cowell Hardware, Cowell Roadhouse.

Permits are required at all other camp sites including Ulbana Weir, RV Park and accesses along Beach Road for \$10 per night per vehicle or \$50 per week per vehicle with a maximum stay of 14 days.

Local Residents and Rate Payers are able to camp at no cost.
