All persons entering the Council office for RAT kit distribution, should be wearing a mask.

Customers are eligible for 5 x RAT kits a month, but no more than 2 lots (10 kits) in a 3 monthly period.

ROADS

When William bought the land, sections 113 and 114: in the hundred of Minbrie, the original road was surveyed through these sections to meet the hundred boundary at the Pooch-a water reserve. This alignment would have effectively divided the agricultural land into at least eight small portions.

William and the later owners had ongoing discussions with the council on alternative routes which would. have been a considerable improvement for the travelling public.

William was not satisfied with the original route so he offered an alternative although it consisted of good land that had been used for agricultural purposes. This affected only two owners, one of whom was his son, William junior, who owned Minbrie Park, being section ID in the hundred of Minbrie. Road access was guaranteed to the owners of Minbrie Park through section 113 to the main road at Pikes Corner. This arrangement was in existence for well over 50 years before Dad bought the farm, known as Badman's farm.

The piece of land that William senior had in mind was on the south side of section 113 and 114, these sections joined on to sections 110 and 134 both in the hundred of Minbrie and at that time belonged to the Pike and Wakelin families. The land for the proposed road turned left at this junction and had to cross two creeks, the first known as Windmill Creek, which when in flood carried huge amounts of water due to the steep run off.

There were hundreds of acres of very steep hills and the creeks to drain this boundary were at least four miles long. The second creek was commonly known as the Culvert Creek. Predictably, at this creek a culvert was built to bridge the sharp drop of the waters. It was constructed of the native pine that grew profusely in these areas. Most of the timber used was fairly heavy, and if I recall correctly the majority was split and to my knowledge there has never been any timber replacement needed. But the earth works were badly washed away on a couple of occasions, although a very solid spill way had been provided. This spillway was made of a very solid wall of heavy stones and it was not until the drought-breaking thunderstorm of 1930 that this wall was eventually damaged When it was repaired the council did not re-build the spillway and needless to say after heavy rains the road was damaged many times.


With the construction of the road the owners of section 12 in the hundred of Minbrie had easy access to this facility, their gateway being between the two creeks. This road from Danger Corner served the public in general for a period of nearly on hundred years.

A council overseer, Fred Spender, was very concerned about the road from Danger Corner to the *top* of "White Hill. This was a, narrow winding road and Fred was anxious to improve the alignment as the trucks carting wheat were becoming bigger and the cars travelling faster. He enlisted my co-operation regarding re-alignment through my property. I agreed to meet him at a certain time on site. There were a few pegs placed along the line which he proposed to take. I was very astonished that such a plan be put into action. We stood in the cutting of White Hill road discussing the situation, firstly his proposal which I rejected, but then I made a counter proposal suggesting that the road be straightened by filling two gullies and lowering the top of a small hill This was adopted and I considered this alignment provided moving machinery with a very clear vision each way.

Again in 1981 Brian Foote, who was the overseer, came to me several times about the re-alignment of the road. The problem section was from the entrance gate to Poodra where the existing road would not permit improvement. The only real possibility was from the steep rise north of our gate, cutting across the top of section 114, with all agricultural land to the hill south side of this section.

This area of land would be built up for the road purposes thus denying us free access to the agricultural land below, the only other access would he past the dam on the east side of the road. Brian made mention of the original surveyed road and asked if I knew the route it took, my answer was in the affirmative. I also mentioned that there were three survey pegs still in position and that I could show him their location.

Did you know that camping areas are provided in Franklin Harbour:

Permits within the Port Gibbon & Lucky Bay area are \$15 per night or \$75 per week.

Permits are required at all other camp sites including Ulbana Weir, RV Park and accesses along Beach Road for \$10 per night or \$50 per week.

Permits can be purchased at pay stations along beach road as well as the Council Office, Hardware and the Roadhouse.

All campers must have self contained toilet facilities except where toilet facilities are provided.

Local Residents and Rate Payers are able to camp at no cost.
