

Works on the new park area/wetland commence

Works have commenced raising the rock that will form the base of our new park area/wetland in the area enclosed by the new road across the Cowell Foreshore area. In coming weeks the job of filling this large area and constructing the wetland will commence. The wetland will both add to the open space and the aesthetics of our foreshore but it will also play an important role in protecting the marine environment of Franklin Harbour by minimising town storm water run-off into the harbour, and any waters from the wetland that do flow into the harbour will have been filtered through the wetland ecosystem.

A Park to Remember

Council are working with the RSL to make the wetland area one of remembrance for those that made the ultimate sacrifice for their country, very often in countries far from home.

Australians have always had a strong sense of fairness and justice, and this has led this country to often "punch above it's weight" in answering the call to war. Since European settlement in 1788, Australian's have fought in 10 wars, and over 100,000 of our serving personnel have lost their lives. It was from the Gallipoli campaign of WW1 that the term Anzac was coined, and the Anzac legend was born. The Anzac's were renowned for their extreme bravery and loyalty, their rather easy going attitude, and a tendency to larrikin type behaviour at times. One in five (or almost 60,000) of the original ANZAC's of WW1 would not make it home. This was an enormous sacrifice for what was a fledgling country, but as well as heartbreak the nation felt enormous pride and gratitude for our soldiers actions, bravery and sacrifice.

War memorials sprung up across the country in virtually all towns and cities. The impact of these losses on small towns was often particularly devastating, and felt for generations.

This pride and gratitude towards the Anzac's endures to this day, and is most clearly in evidence on both Anzac and Remembrance Day when crowds representing all generations from the youngest to the oldest gather at war memorials across the country to remember. And of course we are not just remembering the fallen, we are remembering all of the brave men and women that contributed to the war efforts that have enabled us to live the lives that we enjoy today in "The Lucky Country".

The Anzac spirit is strong in Australia, it is a part of who we are as a nation and a people.

How many of you can say that listening to a lone bugle play "The Last Post" and/or someone reciting "The Ode" doesn't engender strong emotions? For most of us, it gets us every time and we cannot begin to explain it, it is just the way it is! It is a part of being Australian because we do remember them, as we surely should.

This new park will be a place for reflection, and learning something of the individuals whose names are listed on our war memorial, and for paying our respects to those that gave so much.

It will also be an area to enjoy, and given that the Anzac's were almost as famous for "mucking about" as they were for their ferocity as soldiers, it is easy to imagine that they would approve.

ROADS

But during our conversation I learnt that the old road from Mangalo was to be used and from where the read met on the T-Junction it would drop down several feet where it met the new road. This could not be allowed to happen and it still would be known as Danger Corner as the heavily ladened trucks would have a great deal of difficulty negotiating the corner with safety. I decided to say at the next council meeting to be held within a couple of week that this plan would have to be vigorously rejected. This I did and the other councillors did not seem to be very favorably inclined. Never the less I persisted and finally proposed that the district engineer be aske to visit the council area immediately and he consented. But unfortunately for me the grain harvest had started rather quickly and I could not attend this inspection. However, the Councillors, Clerk and District engineer visited the C.B.H office where the matters were fully discussed.

The engineer had a very good map with him and I pointed out the route I considered the toad should follow. When the inspection party returned to Cowell they all agreed that my criticism of the surveyed road had merit, and the route that I had marked on the map was followed. This corner is now negotiated easily and it would have been much better had the overseer lowered a small hump on the Mangalo road near the corner. There should have been a set of charges laid to lower this hump about eighteen inches. I hope this will be rectified on day.

The drainage on the new road was pitiful. I have never found out whether the surveyors marked the place where the drainage pipes were to be placed; so much water missed the drainage pipes. There is still one piped placed on this road that has never had water through it. There is another place by the old house that should have had a double pipe to take the water to grazing land. Instead of this the drainage area takes in steep country to a double pipe a kilometer away to be drained on to agricultural land. These failings are visible to the untrained eye so much for technical progress.

We were asked to stop erecting fence lines for a period, but immediately the blasting was finished and the road works finished we found that road had been opened to traffic. This was indeed of some concern as we expected we would have been given a reasonable time to at least finish on side, as it was possible for the sheep to stray on to the road.

With the alteration to the section of the Mangalo road this added further pressure on Malcolm and myself. Fortunately lan arrived home from Western Australia where the shearing round had finished. His being home certainly helped enormously. We lengthened the distance between the wooden posts and used two tractors for the staining of the cyclone wire. The distance between the strains was not very long and once the wire was stapled to the posts the second tractor was ready to take over and the first tractor unhitched. This certainly sped up the fencing task.

Hurriedly we engaged Roger Gaston to fence the remainder of the new fence, in an effort to stop the sheep from straying on to the new road. The fire and council's action in opening the new road to the public certainly caused us much pain and expense. The fence line consisted of six wires and as the tractor was driven along the road, the spacers were fixed to the wire. There was a certain amount of tension on the wire as we travelled along the fence line, and when the strainer was reached it was only a matter of minutes to tie the wires to the strainers. Now all that was left to do was to have the gates made and seeing onto the strainer post, and the job would completed.

Never have I sone so much fencing in such a short time.

There was a few places along the fence lines where the panels were swinging high that had to be fastened down to stop the lambs from going underneath and this way duly completed.

Over the years William Jacobs and his descendants would like to believe that they have contributed to the safety of traveling public by allowing the new road to be surveyed through the family farm thereby dividing the farm in two, despite being burnt out by the disastrous fire in 1980. We trust you, the public, appreciate our efforts.

Camping Around Franklin Harbour

Did you know that camping areas are provided in Franklin Harbour:

Permits within the Port Gibbon & Lucky Bay area are \$15 per night or \$75 per week. Permits are required at all other camp sites including Ulbana Weir, RV Park and accesses along Beach Road for \$10 per night or \$50 per week. Permits can be purchased at pay stations along beach road as well as the Council Office, Hardware and the Roadhouse. To book a site at Point Gibbon permits must be obtained online at www.eyrepeninsula.com/camping. All campers must have self contained toilet facilities except where toilet facilities are provided.

Local Residents and Rate Payers are able to camp at no cost.
